A note from Reverend Phil...

"Lord our God, all this abundance that we have provided for building you a temple for your Holy Name comes from your hand, and all of it belongs to you."

1 Chronicles 29:16

King David has been advised through the prophet Nathan that he was not the one to build the Temple for God in Jerusalem, but instead that would be a job for his son Solomon. David then accepted the responsibility to prepare the way for Solomon by setting aside the building materials needed so that when Solomon was ready, building could begin immediately. King David accepted and celebrated in his place and call in the building of the temple. He gave literally all his wealth to prepare for that day. David understood that all that we are, and have, and all we will ever be or have comes from God. And our eternity is assured not by our actions, but as a gift freely given, paid for on a cross in Calgary. God has given so much to us, we truly know abundance. God seeks for us to know joy and comfort in our relationship with Jesus that God holds nothing back, but freely gives all we have. Our wealth, material possessions, and even our loving relationships are all gifts to us so that we can experience God's love, and draw near towards a deeper relationship.

There is a second part of this as well; we are also called to give as freely as we have received. We need to know that God's love towards humanity goes beyond us but also includes all. In fact God's love is so great that God entrusts us to be light in this world calling others to experience God's love through us. We are not meant to hoard God's gifts, but to pass them along to another who is seeking to find that place where hope and grace exist. Between the four Gospels of the New Testament Jesus is quoted sharing forty different parables. Of these over half of them are about money, or giving. More than any other topic, Jesus taught about money and giving through parables. Why? Because God knows that our greatest challenge will be the idolatry of money. Money is not meant to be something to keep score, or to define worth, instead money is no more than any other tool in our toolbox. It is meant to build and repair broken people and those who are lost. This is the primary use and the full value of money.

We are preparing to put together a new way of doing the budget here at MUMC. We want to set apart different ministry areas with the ability to grow and dream God-sized dreams. To accomplish this we need to be able to put together a responsible budget in response to the reality of our ability in generosity. Starting last Sunday and through the rest of October there will be green cards labeled "Estimates of Generosity." We ask that you fill one out to give us an idea of what we have to work with so that we can dream big dreams for living our call in this unique time and place. Please be sure to fill one out in the sanctuary and place in the offering plate. This is an important response for us all for what God is doing.

$Greek\ words\ for\ love\quad {}_{\text{From\ Wikipedia,\ the\ free\ encyclopedia}}$

The <u>Greek language</u> distinguishes at least four different ways as to how the word <u>love</u> is used. <u>Ancient Greek</u> has four distinct words for <u>love</u>: *agápe*, *éros*, *philía*, and *storgē*. However, as with other languages, it has been historically difficult to separate the meanings of these words when used outside of their respective contexts. Nonetheless, the senses in which these words were generally used are as follows:

<u>Agápe</u> means "love: esp. brotherly love, charity; the love of God for man and of man for God." <u>Agape</u> is used in ancient texts to denote feelings for one's children and the feelings for a spouse, and it was also used to refer to a <u>love feast</u>. Agape is used by Christians to express the unconditional love of God for his *children*. This type of love was further explained by Thomas Aquinas as "to will the good of another."

<u>Eros</u> means "love, mostly of the sexual passion." The Modern Greek word "<u>erotas</u>" means "intimate love." <u>Plato</u> refined his own definition: Although <u>eros</u> is initially felt for a person, with contemplation it becomes an appreciation of the beauty within that person, or even becomes appreciation of beauty itself. Plato does not talk of physical attraction as a necessary part of love, hence the use of the word <u>platonic</u> to mean, "without physical attraction." In the <u>Symposium</u>, the most famous ancient work on the subject, Plato has Socrates argue that <u>eros</u> helps the <u>soul</u> recall knowledge of beauty, and contributes to an understanding of spiritual truth, the ideal "Form" of youthful beauty that leads us humans to feel erotic desire – thus suggesting that even that sensually-based love aspires to the non-corporeal, spiritual plane of existence; that is, finding its truth, just like finding any truth, leads to transcendence. Lovers and philosophers are all inspired to seek truth through the means of <u>eros</u>.

<u>Philia</u> means "affectionate regard, friendship," usually "between equals." It is a dispassionate virtuous love, a concept developed by <u>Aristotle</u>. In his best-known work on ethics, <u>Nicomachean Ethics</u>, <u>philia</u> is expressed variously as loyalty to friends, family, and community, and requires virtue, equality, and familiarity. Furthermore, in the same text <u>philos</u> denotes a general type of love, used for love between family, between friends, a desire or enjoyment of an activity, as well as between lovers.

<u>Storge</u> means "love, affection" and "especially of parents and children" It's the common or natural empathy, like that felt by parents for offspring. Rarely used in ancient works, and then almost exclusively as a descriptor of relationships within the family. It is also known to express mere acceptance or putting up with situations, as in "loving" the tyrant.





Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Tips

Please use one of the red and green GO boxes or a regular size cardboard shoebox.

They are a standard size that packs easily into the shipping cartons at the relay center. While plastic boxes seem practical, many times they break and end up in the "shoebox hospital" at the processing center.

Boy or Girl

Determine the gender and age category: 2-4 years, 5-9 years, or 10-14 years. Attach the appropriate label (from the OCC pamphlet) on the box lid. Once the box is full, put a rubber-band around the box.

Please focus on the practical! This one box will be shared with all members of the child's home, neighbors, friends, etc. The one washcloth you include may be used by 10 people living with the child! The simple items you take for granted each day could make all the difference in this child's life! Below are some ideas to get you started.

Hygiene items (These items will be shared by everyone living with the child. That could be 10-20 people!)

Toothbrush

Toothpaste (can remove packaging)

Mild bar soap (leave in packaging & put in a plastic baggie)

Comb

Washcloth

School Supplies (The school supplies you send could mean the difference in whether or not the child gets to attend school.)

Pens

Pencils & sharpener Crayons or markers

Paper

Solar calculator

Clothing

Shirts (plain colors)

Pants

Shorts

Shoes

Socks

Underwear

Hats/mittens

Other

Flashlights & batteries (This could be lifesaving for children escaping war or domestic violence)

Sunglasses

Hard candy or lollipops (double bag all candy)

Tools

Duct tape

Sewing kit/fabric

Cups, bowls, empty water bottle

Toys (Focus on the practical but still include a few fun items)

Balls (even a deflated soccer ball with a hand pump)

Slinky

Stuffed animal

Small cars

Yo-yos

Jump ropes

Harmonicas

DO NOT INCLUDE:

Used/damaged items

War-related items (toy guns, knives, military figures, or any action figure holding a weapon)

Chocolate or food (could melt or spoil)

Out-of-date candy

Liquids/lotions (containers can break ruining other

items in the box)

Medications/vitamins

Breakable items (snow globes, glass containers, etc.)

Aerosol cans

Include \$7 Donation

This covers the shipping cost to ensure your gift reaches the right child. 
