A note from Reverend Phil...

“To the one who is victorious, I will give the right to sit with me on my throne, just as I was victorious and sat down with my Father on his throne. Whoever has ears, let them hear what the Spirit says to the churches.”

(Rev. 3:21-22)

This scripture comes from Revelations chapter three, where John is recording Jesus coming to him in a vision or a dream to speak to the church of Laodicea. The church of Laodicea was neither warm nor cold... There was worship, but the spirit was ambiguous. In my mind's eye, I see this as a church that is focused on internal worship, but not on spiritual response into their community. As self-serving but not out reaching. Neither on fire with the spirit, nor cold in death... But just existing within and for itself. I wonder if many of our American churches fall into this category? What is it that we have lost? How did this happen? I believe we have become Jaded by life, because we no longer look to the Divine for our help, because we can help ourselves, right? We dream dreams that sometimes find fulfillment, and others end in disappointment. But what are our dreams? Are they for us, or humanity to the glory of God? If we cannot always fulfill our own dreams, then what hope do we have for God sized dreams?

God sized dreams are for others to God's glory, our dreams are so often for our own benefit. To have God sized dreams are not an “either/or” reality for our own dreams. It is right and good to have dreams for greater success, health, joy for ourselves and those we love, but not to the elimination of God's dreams for the ones God loves. We must make room for both. As disciples are we not to love as God loves those whom God loves?

So, let us take a moment to dream God sized dreams... How can we reach the least, lost, and hopeless to God's glory from this place? Can we do more to feed the hungry, clothe the poor? How can God reach out to those with mental illness, or health concerns? Is it possible that here in the buckle of the corn belt, we could reach out to another community in another country, to drill a well for clean water? Provide seeds for a harvest to feed their own? Perhaps even join with them to teach better agricultural techniques? Dare we dream that we will work to improve our own faith development so that we can reach out to others where they are teaching bible studies in homes and coffee shops?

The Holy Spirit will speak to us in our dreams and visions in prayer and bible study. How is Jesus calling you to dream? I would expect that your dreams might also be dreams of others unspoken, and coming together to begin to share this dream is the first step into making these Holy dreams into Kingdom realities all to God's glory.

So let's let loose the power of the Holy Spirit and dream God sized dreams, and then let us get together, and talk about it... God is preparing us to be glorified in this place!

**MUMC Single Board Meeting
September 19, 2017
Wesley Hall
6:00 p.m.**

Present: Al Remling, Bruce Nodurft, Toby Tutton, Charlie Dighton, Randy Waterman, Kathy Waterman, Marge Wolter, Zach Rogers, Jean Gross, Pastor Phil, Mark Reth, Susan Hermann.

Chairperson Mark Reth called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m. in Wesley Hall. He led us in the Call to Worship which he chose from Luke 18:15-17. We are reminded that to be childlike is to be trusting and faithful as opposed to childish which is marked by immaturity and disobedience. We need to come to Christ as a child being childlike and obedient.

Prayers and praises were lifted up followed by a moment of silence and prayers for guidance.

Reports:

Finance reported that our year to date income (January 1 - August 31) was \$177,125 and our year to date budgeted amount was \$177,440 which is a deficit of only \$315. Our actual year to date expenses have been \$24,899 less than budgeted for that same amount of time. We have a surplus thus far for the year of that amount.

Trustees reported that as part of the agreement of buying the property to the south was to pay the final property taxes and that payment will happen this month. Two bids have been received for the demolition of that house and the lowest bid of \$8000 has been accepted by the trustees. Demolition should happen in the next couple of months. The city has marked some of our sidewalk for repair and this issue will be taken care of soon. Trustees and staff are in the beginning stages of considering moving the church office, pastor office and the work room to the lower east wing pending finding a way to make that area handicapped accessible. They will be looking into the feasibility of a chair lift using the existing railing.

Congregational Care reported that four people are in need of background checks so they can proceed with visitation training. The health clinic saw four people in August. Grief Share is in its 10th week of meeting as a group. There is the suggestion of hosting four meals per year for those who have lost spouses. Susan also reminded us that it's not too early to get your flu shot.

Staff/Parish reported that our new office assistant Kat Rogers has started her job and is happy to be with us. She is a welcoming presence. We will be meeting this week to discuss budgeting issues as they pertain to staff.

Missions reported the church garden is producing and thanked those who have helped with watering during the dry spell. Pumpkin picking at Sherman's is Thursday night. Help with picking up pumpkins and earn money to go towards missions. The mission trip to Texas for next summer is in the beginning stages and four buses have been reserved for use by the Northeast and East Central Districts. Final participant numbers need to be in by March of next year.

Reaching and Receiving reported that the church fun day at Sherman's Pumpkin patch will be on October 15 starting at 3:00. A light supper will be provided. Bring a lawn chair and enjoy the campfire. We are in the process of looking at "radical hospitality" as a group and having a sharing time with the congregation as time permits.

Education reported that Sunday School has started and there are three groups meeting. Pre-school/elementary, Middle School and High School.

Kathy Waterman who has chaired UMW addressed the board and stated that the UMW voted to disband on September 6, 2017. The money in their account will be turned over to the church to be used for women's ministries. The kitchen committee will stay in place. Kitchen supplies have been paid for from funeral funds. 2018 budget amount for kitchen supplies should be about \$1500.00. The sewing group will stay in place. Pastor gave a blessing to this faithful group of women and thanked them for the work that they have accomplished over the many years in our church.

New paperback pew Bibles in the New International Version will be ordered. This version will correspond to what pastor uses as scripture references during worship. The old Bibles will be given away.

Mark Reth, our new chair, is looking for a vice-chair.

Budget numbers must be in at our next meeting which will be Tuesday, October 17, 2017 in Wesley Hall at 6:00 p.m.

We closed at 8:00 p.m. with the Lord's Prayer and singing of the Doxology.

Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Tips

Please use one of the red and green GO boxes or a regular size cardboard shoebox.

They are a standard size that packs easily into the shipping cartons at the relay center. While plastic boxes seem practical, many times they break and end up in the "shoebox hospital" at the processing center.

Boy or Girl

Determine the gender and age category: 2-4 years, 5-9 years, or 10-14 years. Attach the appropriate label (from the OCC pamphlet) on the box lid. Once the box is full, put a rubber-band around the box.

Gifts

Please focus on the practical! This one box will be shared with all members of the child's home, neighbors, friends, etc. The one washcloth you include may be used by 10 people living with the child! The simple items you take for granted each day could make all the difference in this child's life! Below are some ideas to get you started.

Non-Liquid Hygiene items

(These items will be shared by everyone living with the child. That could be 10-20 people!)

Toothbrush

Mild bar soap (leave in packaging & put in a plastic baggie- Ivory is a great choice because it floats)

Comb

Washcloth

Stick deodorant

Non-liquid lip balm

Adhesive bandages

Nail clippers & files

School Supplies (The school supplies you send could mean the difference in whether or not the child gets to attend school.)

Pens

Pencils (**sharpen beforehand if possible**) & sharpener

Crayons or markers

Paper (Steno notebooks fit well in shoeboxes)

Solar calculator

Coloring or picture books

Glue sticks

Clothing/Accessories

Shirts (plain colors)

Pants/Shorts

Shoes/Socks

Underwear

Hats/mittens

Hair bows/jewelry

Other

Flashlights & batteries (**This could be lifesaving for children escaping war or domestic violence**)

Sunglasses

Tools (No saws or pocket knives)

Duct tape

Sewing kit/fabric

Cups, bowls, empty water bottle

Fishing kits

Toys (Focus on the practical but still include a few fun items)

Balls (even a deflated soccer ball with a hand pump)

Slinky

Stuffed animal

Small cars

Yo-yos

Jump ropes

Harmonicas

Puzzles & binoculars

DO NOT INCLUDE:

Used/damaged items

War-related items (toy guns, knives, military figures, or any action figure holding a weapon)

Candy/ Chocolate or food (could melt or spoil)

Out-of-date candy

Liquids/lotions (containers can break ruining other items in the box)

Medications/vitamins

Breakable items (snow globes, glass containers, etc.)

Aerosol cans

Include \$7 Donation

In 2006, two brothers began Matthew 25, an independent, local 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, to help strengthen and elevate neighborhoods on the west side of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. When those neighbors needed help recovering from the 2008 flood, Matthew 25 partnered with other organizations to invest more than \$6 million to empower people to rebuild 25 blocks and renew their neighborhoods – Block by Block.

The Block by Block program has been recognized statewide and nationally as a model for disaster recovery and neighborhood revitalization. More than 250 families were able to move back into their homes because of the work of Matthew 25. Using our neighborhood organizational and community development skills, Matthew 25 has grown today into a stable, committed organization that is a leader in finding a neighborhood's potential and building on it. Through volunteers, partners and contributors, our innovative programs help people strengthen their own communities.

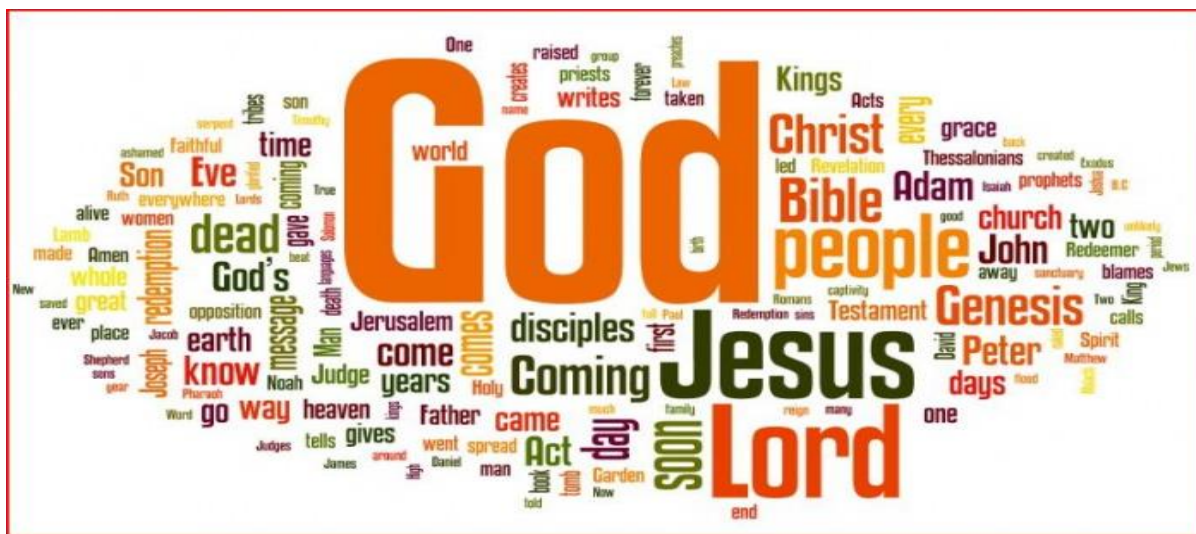
