

A note from Reverend Phil...

¹¹ So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, ¹² to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up ¹³ until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-13)

It's January 2018! What new blessings and challenges await us in this New Year? What New Year resolutions have we made? What new goals? What new dreams? Do we understand the difference between goals and dreams? Dreams are thigs we wish for, goals are the things we work towards. Many goals begin as dreams, but without the necessary labor to see them reality, they shall remain dreams.

As a church we have a dream of welcoming in the Kingdom of God in this place and time... Every week this is our prayer when we *pray "Thy Kingdom come Thy Will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."* But is this just a dream? Perhaps a God sized dream, or is it our Lord and Saviors goal? If it is a goal, then it shall require the effort of the body, Christ's church! What is our place and call in this God sized dream? How are we living this out to transfer this Divine dream into a Kingdom goal?

Lent seems to come early this year. The Education Team has a dream that our church family will come together for five weeks during the Lenten season in a church wide bible study to help us all to draw near to God, for the sake of our Kingdom goal.

We are looking for small group leaders that will share their time and talents to lead this study in their homes, places of work, here at church, wherever two or more may gather. We are also seeking that all make time, about an hour per week, to join together in this study by joining one of the short term study groups. I will be preaching from this study each Sunday of Lent, and this will enable us to get the most out of this amazing story of grace.

We will be studying from Max Lucado's book "He Chose The Nails." This study is supported by a video and a study guide. (And a leader's guide for group leaders!) This is a five week study beginning the Sunday after Ash Wednesday (February 14) and ending on March 18th as we prepare to enter into Holy Week.


So happy New Year! Let us start this year off with time of friends, fellowship, and faith development together!

MUMC Single Board December 19, 2017 Wesley Hall 6:00 p.m.

Present: Zach Rogers, Janine Stellick, Susan Hermann, Marge Wolter, Ruth Voshell, Randy Waterman, Charlie Dighton, Pastor Phil, Al Remling, Bruce Nodurft, Mark Reth, Jean Gross.

Chair Mark Reth called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. The responsive Call to Worship was from Luke 2:9-14. Mark shared a partial reading from "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Clause" and reminded us that with childlike innocence we can know God beyond what we can see.

Prayers and praises were lifted up. We need to remember there are many amongst us that are facing health challenges and/ or the pain of loss this Christmas. After a moment of silence Mark led a prayer for guidance

<u>Finance:</u> Bruce reported that the 2018 budget after adjustments represents a 2.8% increase over 2017. The budget for 2017 was \$266,170 and actual expenses for this year through November with apportionment payments are \$213,570 which gives us a surplus of \$26,813. Bruce gave us an update on how endowment funds are to be distributed according to the original charter. 10% is designated to missions, 60% to property and 30% to programming. These percentages could be re-addressed in the future if there is a need to do that.

<u>Trustees:</u> Charlie reported that we have paid the bill to take down the tree on the new property that was struck by lightning. There will be a storage building placed on that lot in addition to it being used for parking. He is seeking input as to what type of building and the size needed.

Worship: All the large wreaths in the sanctuary will be lighted hopefully this week. The live feed has been fixed on our computer.

<u>Christian Ed.</u> Someone will be sharing a Ministry Minute inviting the whole congregation to take part as small groups in a five week study during Lent. The study is based on the book "He Chose the Nails". Lent begins on February 18. Pastor will also be basing his sermons on this theme.

<u>Missions:</u> Zach reported that the Angel Tree gifts have been shared with those families chosen from our community. He will be doing a ministry minute next year on the recent mission projects completed at our church. The mission for January is UMCOR.

Reaching and Receiving: Janine noted that we have reserved four lanes (up to six people per lane) at our bowling alley for a bowling party for our church family on February 11 from 3:00-5:00. We can bring in cookies, bars, etc. but no other food as they have their own food source there. They are providing shoes free and funds are available for renting of the lanes. There will also be a pancake breakfast after church that Sunday as Lent will be starting soon. Pastor will find a group willing to do this as a fund raiser.

<u>Congregational Care:</u> Susan told us about the Christmas Day potluck dinner at our church. The meat will be provided. So far about 40 people have indicated they are coming. She has held four clinics after church and has seen 24 people. Grief Share has complete courses of study and the group has decided to meet once a month for a potluck and sharing time. This is an ongoing ministry.

<u>Staff-Parish:</u> Randy reported that they met with Kat for her 90 day evaluation. She had a couple of concerns that will hopefully be addressed soon.

One Board adjourned for a closed meeting at 7:30 and reopened at 8:30 for adjournment.

Next meeting will be January 16, 2018 in Wesley Hall at 6:00 p.m.

We closed with the Lord's Prayer and singing of the Doxology.

Getting to Know The Congregation:

Ray Wycoff

(Q) What brought you here?

(A) I was transferred from the Sioux City Iowa Conservation Service to Delaware County on June 23rd, 1966. My wife and I were both Methodists and have belonged to this church since then.

(A) Someone who knows that they don't know everything and that there's always something that can be learned.

Perhaps it's a lot to buy everything at once for a whole bucket, but how many times have you shopped at the grocery store and had money left over to donate an extra item to the needy? If you drop off an item such as an extra bottle of dish soap or a set of sponges in our large, yellow supplies bucket (which is located in the church's main entrance) it would be greatly appreciated. If you donate more that's great too. A list of what we can take is also included in this edition of the Chimes. We also would like to have a missions team put buckets together with the supplies we collect. UMCOR CLEANING KIT LIST

-5-gallon round bucket with resealable lid

Buckets from fast-food restaurants or bakeries can be used if washed and cleaned

Do not use buckets that have stored chemicals such as paint or pool cleaner

Advertisements on the outside are acceptable

No square buckets (Only round buckets are used to ensure proper stacking during transportation

-Liquid laundry detergent

One 50-oz. or two 25-oz. bottle(s) only

-Liquid household cleaner

12-16oz. Liquid cleaner that can be mixed with water (No spray cleaners)

-Dish Soap

16-28oz bottle any brand

-1 Can air freshener

Aerosol or pump

-1 insect repellant spray

6-14oz aerosol or spray pump with protective cover

-1 scrub brush

Plastic or wooden handle

-18 Cleaning Wipes

Handy Wipes or reusable wipes, no terry cleaning towels, please remove packaging

-7 Sponges

No cellulose sponges due to mold issues (Non-cellulose sponges or "foam sponges" only. Foam or man-made sponges will not retain water and cause mildew.)

These sponges can be found in the household and automotive departments of stores and some restaurant supplies houses. Some commonly available brands include but are not limited to: Scotch-Brite Dobie All-Purpose Pad, Lysol, Multi-Purpose Durable Scrub Sponge, Scrub Daddy Original, Melamine Foam Kitchen Wash Cleaning Sponge.

Remove from wrapper.

-5 Scouring Pads

Remove from wrapper (No stainless steel, Brillo pads, or SOS pads) (Nothing with soap built in)

-50 Clothespins

-Clothesline

One 100-ft. or two 50-ft. lines (Cotton or plastic)

-24 Roll heavy-duty trash bags

33 to 45 gallon sizes (Remove from the box)

-5 Dust Masks

-2 Pairs kitchen dishwashing gloves

Should be durable enough for multiple uses (Remove from packaging)

-1 Pair work gloves

Cotton with leather palm or all leather

IMPORTANT NOTES

- All items must be new except for the actual bucket and lid.
- All cleaning agents must be liquid and in plastic containers. No powders, please.
- If you cannot find the requested size of a liquid item, use a smaller size. Including larger sizes of any item will prevent the lid from sealing.
- If all of the items on the list are not included, please put a label on the bucket indicating what has been omitted.
