### A note from Reverend Phil...

"But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but no in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed."-2 Corinthians 4:7-9

On Saturday September 14th & Sunday September 15th Manchester UMC partnered with Delhi/Buck Creek UMC, Strawberry Point UMC, and Edgewood UMC for a John Wesley Revival experience. All together about 100 people participated in at least one of the two day event. The focus was on sharing the Gospel story in a new way so that those who do not know where hope lies might find a connection with one of our church member families. The setting was beautiful, and the worship services were well done. I hope and prayed God would be glorified, and I feel that was accomplished. I know I met two unchurched families that had been invited by one of our church members, and they felt blessed and encouraged.

On Saturday I had to run over to the Amish store to buy more charcoal for the smoker. When I went in, the conversation at the table of folks eating donuts and drinking coffee turned to what we were up to with all this charcoal. When I mentioned we were having the revival they talked about seeing the signs, and then two older gentlemen began reminiscing of when they were younger there seemed to be revivals happening frequently around the area, and how much they enjoyed and were encouraged to see all their neighbors in worship together...and they asked me, "Whatever happened with that?"

I have pondered this question for the last two weeks...What did happen? Has God ceased to be worthy of our worship? Has God's benevolence ceased to occur? Has the presence of Jesus Christ been diminished and thus we see fewer "God Sightings?" Just in my lifetime our cultural shift has been of more than 80% of the population relating to a church to one closer to 50%. What else has happened? Well supposedly life got easier, computers, microwaves, we even now have self driving cars! But I witness a generation that is busier, more stressed, tighter scheduled, than any other time in our history...but we as a rule are wealthier...we are also far more medicated for our moods and spend more in counseling than ever before. It appears that many have traded a trust in God for a trust in themselves, and how they can navigate this life without a faith connection. And it would appear that this new reality does not satisfy. That answer to the question of "whatever happened" is that we have made a choice that we can find hope and encouragement elsewhere, better than what is freely offered in grace. Is this a trajectory of our human condition that we cannot change?

Jesus is waiting to be recognized, to be made known, to walk with us and deliver us from all the hard knocks of life, those we create ourselves, and those which happen because it is the way of the nature of life. Grace abounds for all...come and see, find your rest, then go and tell.

Perhaps it's time to plan another John Wesley Revival...to declare to our community that Jesus lives, God Reigns, and grace and peace are abundant, even for them. Amen.



### A Letter From our SPPRC Chair

### Dear Church Family,

As I reported during the Church service on September 9, 2019, Pastor Phil had requested a renewal leave to begin on October 20 through November 17, 2019. This leave has been approved by the SPPRC Chairperson Mike Wade, Single Board Chairperson Mark Reth, and District Superintendent Paul Wilcox.

### What is a renewal leave?

Under Paragraph 350.3 of *The United Methodist Book of Discipline (2016)*, "a clergy member may request a formational and spiritual growth leave of up to six months while continuing to hold an appointment in the local church." Such a leave is defined as a time freed from normal duties in order to pursue spiritual and personal growth in the practice of ministry, and/or acquiring knowledge in related fields. Renewal leave is intended to prepare pastors to return to their pastoral appointments, empowered to continue their ministries.

### Has Pastor Phil ever taken a renewal leave?

No. Since his time as an Associate Pastor 2004 through his current time assigned to our church, Pastor Phil has not taken any renewal leave.

### Who will preach and be in charge of worship?

Our Worship Design Committee in conjunction with Pastor Phil have developed worship services for the five Sundays that Pastor Phil will be on Leave. The series for this period will be the Apostle's Creed.

October 20- Financial Committee will be making presentations as part of the service.

October 27 – Josh Troutman, Marion Methodist Lay Presenter will be leading the service.

November 3 – Rev. Andrew Happ, Center Point Pastor will be leading service.

November 10 – Dave Gaskill will be leading the service.

November 17 – Rev. Paul Wilcox, District Superintendent will be leading the service.

### Who would handle funerals and pastoral care emergencies in Pastor Phil's absence?

### **Purposes of the Ministerial Renewal Leave**

In today's world, there are few vocations that demand as much from a person as does the call to ministry. Our pastors are expected to be available to the needs of their congregation. They are always "on call." There is healthy respect for the pastor's "day off," but when needs arise, we call our Shepherd! Our pastors "burn out" and the Ministerial Renewal Leave gives time for clear perspective, renewal of soul, mind, and body, and an opportunity to resource for the years ahead. The gospels remind us again and again of our Lord's withdrawal for prayer and to be away from the "crush of the crowd." It is clear that there needs to be time for prayer and reflection in order to renew one's spirit. When one guards one's life and takes time to be at peace, one's work remains strong and one's presence brings consistency and maturity to the work of the church. A Ministerial Renewal Leave gives the needed time of reconstruction and renewal and keeps the pastor in touch with his/her church.

- Infuses new life into the minister.
- Sharpens ministry skills.
- Refocuses the minister's calling and mission.
- Deepens the minister's appreciation of the congregation.

- Return of minister who is energized and refocused.

Chair Mark Reth called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM in Wesley Hall. Mark led the board to *Gather in God's Name* which was from Mark 5:18-20. In reference to the Bible verse Mark read the book *Hooray for Hats!* by Brian Won, to indicate sharing the spirit of the Lord.

Prayers and praises were lifted up followed by a moment of silent reflection and a prayer for guidance from Al.

### **Team Reports:**

**Finance:** Bruce presented the latest financial report. Actual expenses January through August with apportionments paid were \$156, 462 and actual income was \$156,462 which left a small deficit of \$277. A report of donations of pledges to the Brick-by-Brick campaign was given. Total commitments so far are \$106,970.

Updates on this campaign will be given as needed.

Bruce also reported that the CD's at F&M Bank will be maturing on Monday. After discussion, board voted unanimously to reinvest for 18 months at the new interest rate.

Ruth reported that the books had been audited by Kim Trevallion on August 31, 2019. There were no problems. The only suggestion was to send the Heifer and UMCOR funds each month with the apportionment. After discussion, this was approved.

**Trustees:** Charlie reported that the church sign is not working again. The elevator hopefully is working again after problems during the day. The work of the floor of Wesley Hall is being postponed until the first of 2020. Quotes for electrical, carpeting and plumbing are being sought for the office shuffle. Bid has been received for snow removal from the parking lot from Roger Erickson. Bids will be solicited for snow removal from the sidewalks.

Worship: Nothing to report

**Christian Education:** No one has been appointed to fill the chair position.

**Missions:** By unanimous vote the proceeds from the Ice Cream Social will be transferred to the Wesley Hall Floor project.

**Reaching and Receiving:** Janine reported that the Sherman's Fun Day is on schedule for September 29. The church is responsible for the cake and entertainment at the Good Neighbor Home for the October birthday party on October 1.

Staff Parish: Mike Wade presented

**Pastoral Support Form** – Motion by Charlie Dighton, seconded by Bill Scanlan to accept the Form as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

**Pastoral Renewal Leave** – Pastor will be gone for 5 Sundays starting on October 27. After much discussion, this was approved by unanimous vote.

**Church Closure Policy** – After much discussion and minor changes, the policy was approved by unanimous vote. (Will be posted on the web site and in the church and will be given to any desiring to use the church)

Pastor Phil reported that the Charge Conference will be on October 13, 2019 at the Manchester United Methodist Church. He also reported on the Revival at the Buck Creek church. Everyone was pleased with the turnout. There is a revival planned for May, 2020 to kick off the Boat Dock Ministry.

Our next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 15, 2019 in Wesley Hall at 6:04 PM.

Meeting adjourned at 8:05 PM with the Lord's Prayer and singing of the Doxology.

### 'Brick by Brick' Remodel Campaign

Dear members and friends of Manchester United Methodist Church:

In the early 1960's, the members of the Manchester United Methodist Church committed themselves to the idea of demolishing their current church building and replacing it with a new structure. That new building was dedicated in 1965. It has served us well over the past fifty-four years. The building has remained basically the same with very few structural modifications.

As any property or home owner knows, as time goes by, problems begin to arise. Some minor, others more serious. Such is the case with our current church building. Because of the age of our building and the problems needing to be addressed, a building committee made up of members of the congregation and led by the chairman of the trustees was created. Their purpose was to study these concerns and recommend to the Single Board possible solutions.

After several months of brain storming, dreaming, and discussing ideas with an architect, the building committee brought three proposals to the Single Board for their initial review. After several months of consideration and study, the Board unanimously endorsed and approved one specific proposal, and gave the building committee the authority to make a presentation to the church membership.

After several weeks of publicizing the event, a charge conference was convened in January. The charge conference was led by our District Superintendent. The proposed remodeling project was presented to the congregation and after a period of questions and answers, the issue was put to a vote. The voting members were informed that they would cast their vote in secret and that the Single Board had mandated at least a 70% approval of the proposal. The proposal was approved by an 85% majority.

Before MUMC could move forward with a capital campaign, the remodel project now needed to be approved by a district building committee. It took some time for this to happen, but that committee finally came to Manchester in late April. They met with our trustee chairman, toured the facility, and discussed the remodeling project with him. Being satisfied with the information they were presented, the district committee gave their approval.

So the next step in the process is to raise the necessary funds to meet the construction costs of these approved modifications. The current estimate totals \$532,000. Enclosed with this letter is a form for your consideration regarding how much financial support you are willing to provide now and/or in the future for the remodeling effort. When each of us became members of this congregation, we vowed to support it with our time, service, talents, and finances. Just as those members did in the early 1960s, let us now honor our commitment to provide an improved facility for future years.

# Operation Christmas Child Full Circle Story: Dania Yadago

If you missed hearing Dania share her testimony in September, join us after service on Sunday, October 13<sup>th</sup> for a recap of this special event!

Dania Yadago's parents taught her at an early age to take everything to God in prayer. Growing up in poverty in the Middle East, Dania and her family took all of their needs to God, and as a five-year-old, Dania wanted God to answer *all* her prayers. While she may not have felt he was always answering, looking back on her life now as a 26-year-old, she sees how God was providing for her and protecting her family every step of the way.

Often times, our shoe box gifts are given to children who have never even heard of Jesus. That was not the case for Dania as her parents became Christians when she was little; however, her shoe box gift truly was an answer to prayer. Six-year-old Dania was shocked to find that everything in her box was brand new. She loved the decorated pencils, the panda Beanie Baby she played teacher with, the activity book she would fill out and erase so she could do it all again, but the most important gift that was an answer to her family's prayer was a small radio. They desperately wanted access to Christian resources, and this radio provided a way for them to get Christian news and music in a country that was only 2% Christian.

Dania's family felt called to return to their home country in order to share the gospel, but following Christ in this country was not a simple decision. Following Christ here might mean deciding to leave one's family, being forced to leave the village or even facing death. Dania's family was undeterred even when there were threats to burn her father's business and kill the family. Eventually, Dania's parents felt God was telling them it was time to leave, and he provided the means necessary to get the family out of this country before their village was destroyed by terrorists.

In 2010, the Yadago's moved to the United States where they finally had the opportunity to freely worship. After only being here one month, Dania was invited to go to an Operation Christmas Child processing center. She had no idea what this actually meant...had the North Pole moved? When she walked in the processing center, she saw banners with children smiling holding brightly colored shoeboxes. She instantly recognized the tape around the boxes and the logo of the shoebox with wings. Even though she had to leave her shoebox and all her gifts behind, she knew this was the special place where her box had come from. God was providing her with something familiar in an unfamiliar country. God is always faithful. Today, Dania not only packs shoebox gifts, but she works for Operation Christmas Child. She is known as a "full circle story." However, according to Dania, the end of her circle didn't truly come until July 2018 when she had the opportunity to travel to the Philippines for a shoebox distribution. As she called out the names of the children, she realized her circle had come to a close, but she was starting a new circle for each child as she handed them their very own gift...a gift of hope and love from God.

### **Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Tips**

### Please use one of the red and green GO boxes or a regular size cardboard shoebox.

They are a standard size that packs easily into the shipping cartons at the relay center. While plastic boxes seem practical, many times they break and end up in the "shoebox hospital" at the processing center.

### Boy or Girl

Determine the gender and age category: 2-4 years, 5-9 years, or 10-14 years. Attach the appropriate label (from the OCC pamphlet) on the box lid. Once the box is full, put a rubber-band around the box.

### Gifts

*Please focus on the practical!* This one box will be shared with all members of the child's home, neighbors, friends, etc. The one washcloth you include may be used by 10 people living with the child! The simple items you and I take for granted each day could make all the difference in this child's life! Below are some ideas to get you started.

**Non-liquid Hygiene items** (These items will be shared by everyone living with the child. That could be 10-20 people!)

- -Toothbrush
- -Mild bar soap (leave in packaging & put in a plastic baggie; Ivory is a great choice because it floats)
- -Comb
- -Washcloth
- -Stick deodorant
- -Non-liquid lip balm
- -Adhesive bandages
- -Nail clippers & file

**School Supplies** (The school supplies you send could mean the difference in whether or not the child gets to attend school.)

- -Pens
- -Pencils (sharpen beforehand if possible) & sharpener
- -Cravons or markers
- -Paper (Steno notebooks fit well in shoeboxes)
- -Solar calculator
- -Coloring or picture books
- -Glue sticks

### Clothing/Accessories

- -Shirts (plain colors)
- -Pants
- -Shorts
- -Shoes
- -Socks
- -Underwear
- -Hats/mittens -Hair bows
- -Jewelry

#### Other

- -Flashlights & batteries (This could be lifesaving for children escaping war or domestic violence)
- -Sunglasses
- -Tools (no saws or pocketknives)
- -Duct tape
- -Sewing kit/fabric
- -Cups, bowls, empty water bottle
- -Fishing kit

**Toys/WOW** item (Focus on the practical but still include a few fun items)

- -Balls (even a deflated soccer ball with a hand pump)
- -Slinky
- -Stuffed animal
- -Small cars
- -Yo-yos
- -Jump ropes
- -Harmonicas
- -Puzzles
- -Binoculars

### DO NOT INCLUDE:

- -Used/damaged items
- -War-related items (toy guns, knives, military figures, or any action figure holding a weapon)
- -Candy, chocolate or any type of food (could melt or spoil)
- -Toothpaste
- -Liquids/lotions (containers can break ruining other items in the box)
- -Medications/vitamins
- -Breakable items (snow globes, glass containers, etc.)
- -Aerosol cans

### **School supplies:**


4 reams loose paper

For the first few weeks we are emphasizing the five areas that church members promise to take an active part in: prayer, worship, service, witness, and offering. Students have a prayer journal they will be using, a chart to keep track of areas where they have served, a Bible they will be encouraged to study and high light, and material called Collaborate which covers United Methodist History as well as the Old and New Testament. We meet every Sunday down in the Community Room. Our weekly routine involves a fun activity, worship, prayer time and a lesson. We end by reciting the "Do all the good you can" selection attributed to John Wesley. We have had a guest speaker, Alyssa Cashen, who told us about her experiences at a Christian Camp held at Grinnell. Her enthusiasm and description of how her experiences at the camp was a great addition to our class. The teachers will be asking various church members to come to the class for a brief face to face in order for the students to get to know more about the people who attend services here.
